Once again it is the cusp of a new year. Time to wash your training gear and replace items that are worn out. There is no honor by Japanese standards in wearing a threadbare *Gi* or *Hakama*. It is strictly an American fashion to admire ripped jeans or a tattered shirt.

This is the season of renewal and the rituals of *Kagami Biraki* are meant to reinforce that idea. The breaking or "opening" of the *Mochi* symbolizes the end of one cycle and the beginning of the next, just as the cycle of the moon marks the passing of a month. In Japan there is a special affinity for the new and perfectly maintained. One aspect of this is displayed when people exchange gifts.
